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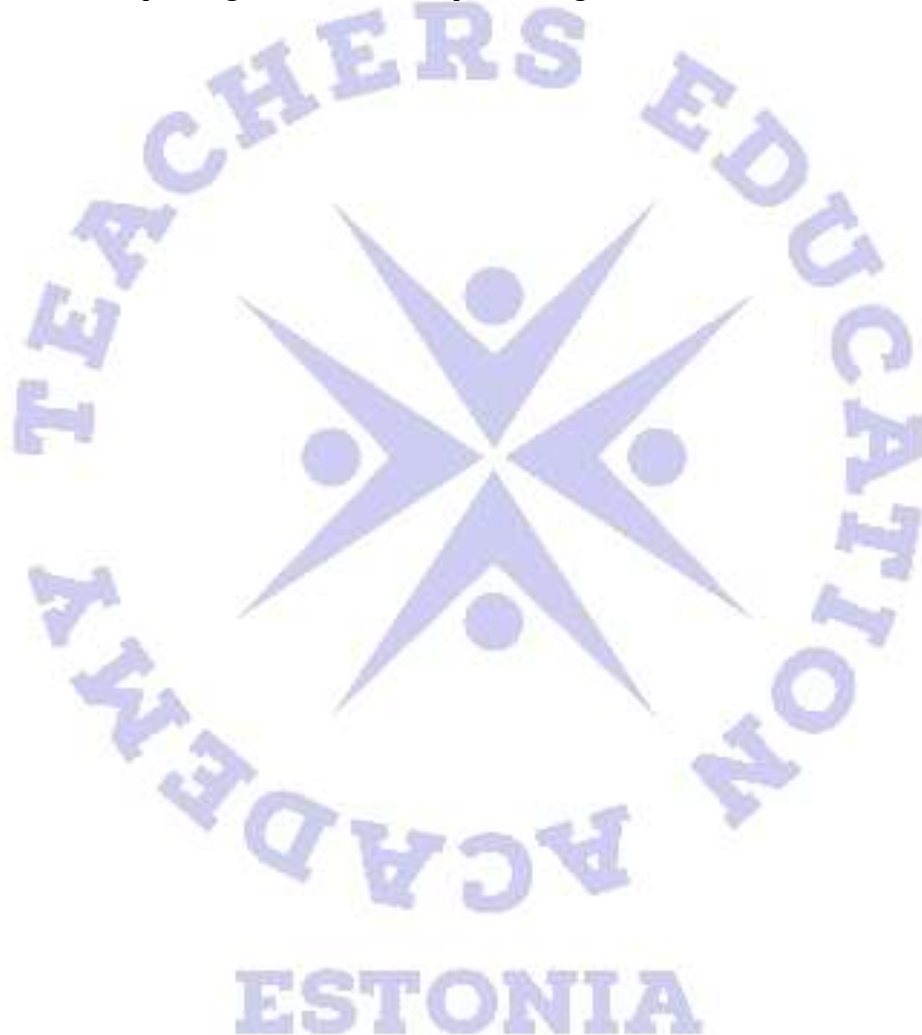
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Human oversight, transparency, fairness, accountability, and privacy remain essential foundations of ethical AI adoption.

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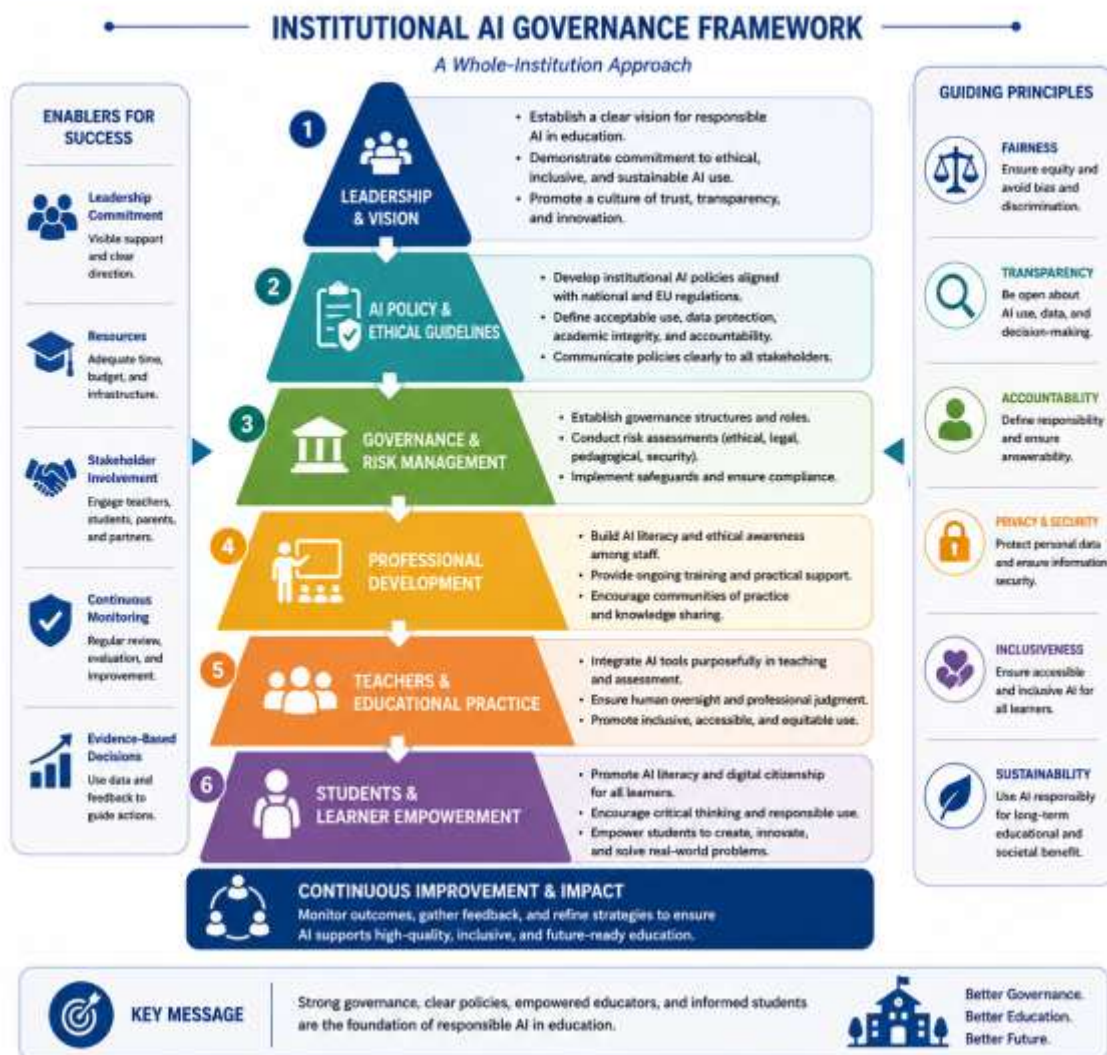

- Improved protection of student rights.

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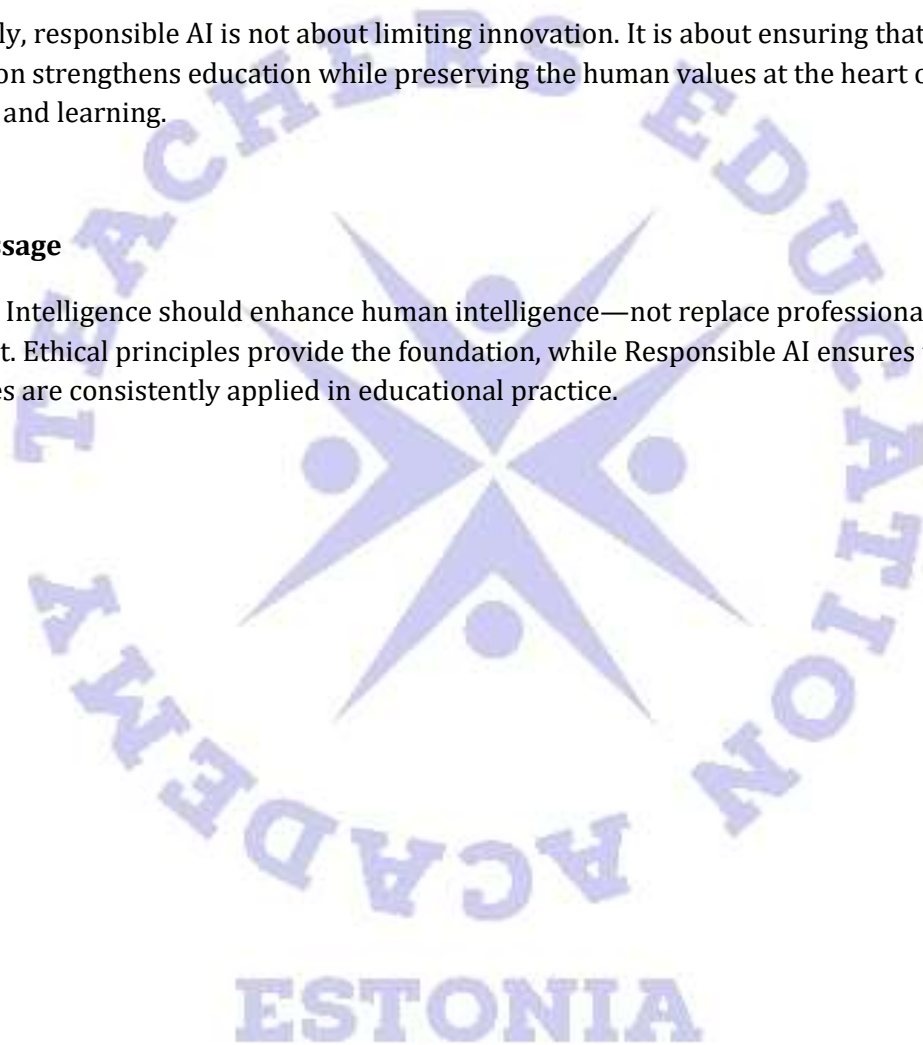
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- More transparent educational decision-making.

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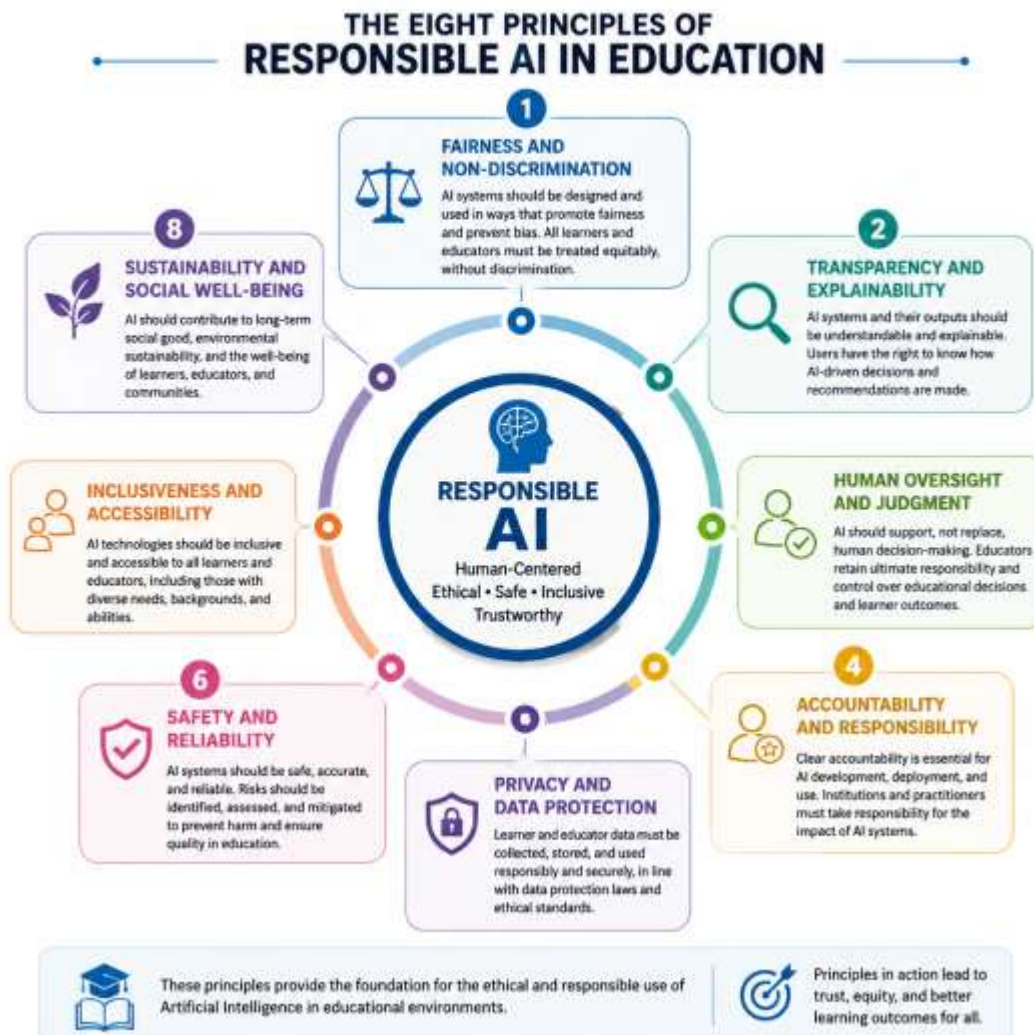
3. Core Principles of Responsible AI in Education

The Eight Principles of Responsible AI in Education

3. Core Principles of Responsible AI in Education

Responsible AI in education is built on a set of core principles that guide the ethical, safe, and human-centered use of AI technologies. These principles help educators, school leaders, and institutions ensure that AI systems support learning, respect human rights, and contribute to inclusive and equitable education for all.



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3.1 Fairness and Non-Discrimination

AI systems should provide equitable opportunities for all learners regardless of gender, age, ethnicity, language, disability, socioeconomic background, religion, or cultural identity.

Because AI systems learn from existing data, they may unintentionally reproduce historical biases present in those datasets. In educational settings, this may result in unfair recommendations, unequal feedback, or biased assessment outcomes.

Educators should therefore critically evaluate AI-generated content to ensure that it:

- Represents diverse perspectives.
- Uses inclusive language.
- Avoids stereotypes.
- Does not disadvantage specific learner groups.
- Supports equitable participation and learning opportunities.

Fairness should remain a continuous consideration throughout the selection, implementation, and evaluation of AI tools.

3.2 Transparency and Explainability

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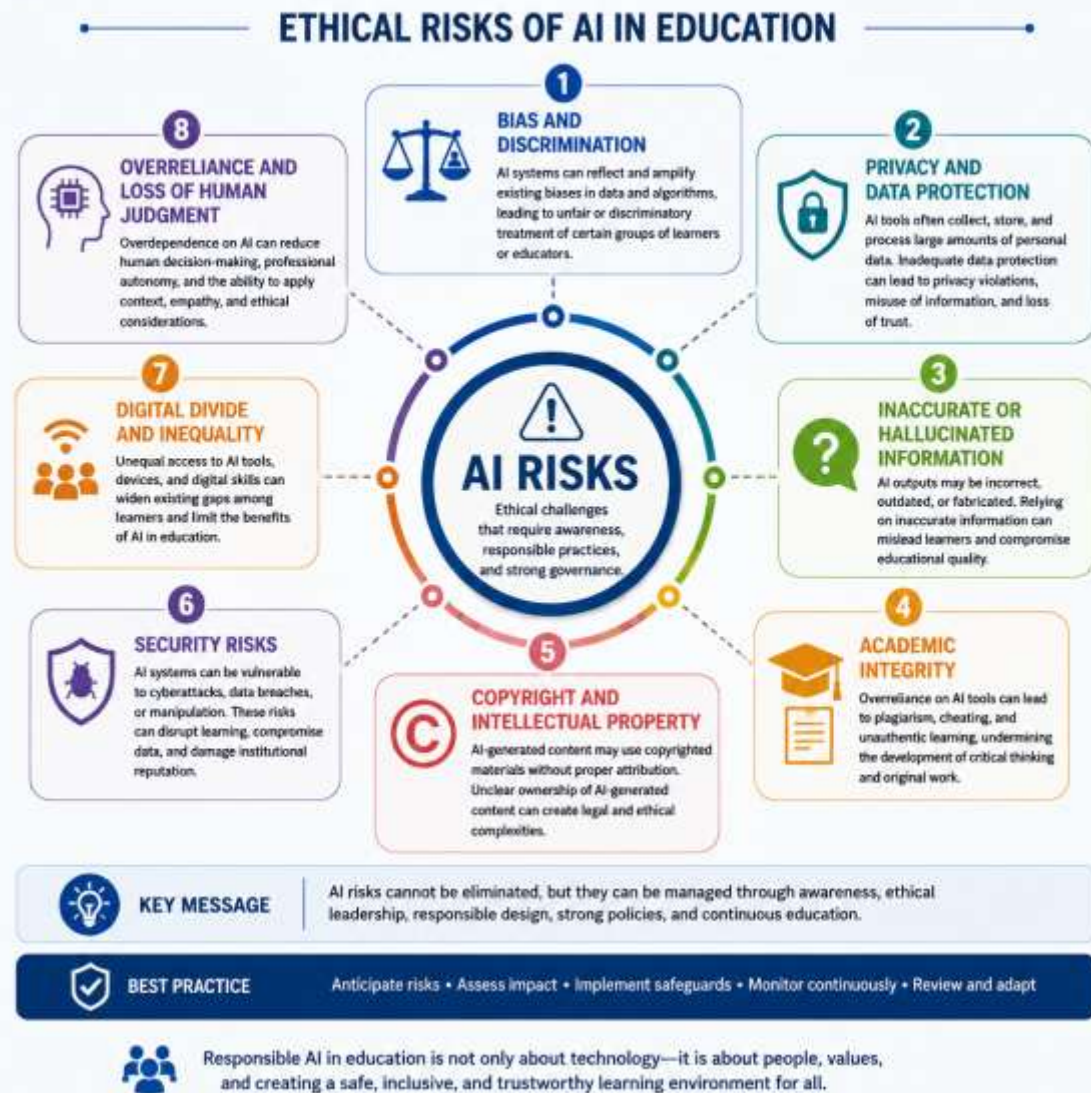

While AI offers great opportunities for education, it also introduces ethical risks that must be understood, mitigated, and continuously monitored. Awareness of these risks is the first step towards responsible and trustworthy AI use.



While artificial intelligence offers significant opportunities for improving teaching and learning, it also introduces a range of ethical, pedagogical, and operational risks.

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Understanding these challenges is essential for ensuring that AI is used responsibly and that its benefits outweigh its potential harms.

This chapter outlines the most common ethical risks associated with AI in educational settings and highlights practical considerations for educators and institutions.

4.1 Algorithmic Bias and Discrimination

AI systems learn from large datasets that may contain historical, cultural, or social biases. As a result, AI-generated outputs can unintentionally reinforce stereotypes or produce unfair recommendations.

In education, algorithmic bias may appear when AI:

- generates culturally biased learning materials;
- produces stereotypical examples or images;
- favors certain language varieties;
- provides unequal recommendations for learners;
- reflects imbalanced or incomplete training data.

Educators should critically review AI-generated content before using it in classrooms and ensure that learning materials reflect diversity, equity, and inclusion.

4.2 Hallucinations and Misinformation

One of the most widely recognized limitations of generative AI is its tendency to produce inaccurate or fabricated information, commonly referred to as *hallucinations*.

AI may confidently generate:

- incorrect facts;
- non-existent references;
- fabricated quotations;
- inaccurate statistics;

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- misleading explanations;
- outdated information.

Because AI-generated responses often appear convincing, users may incorrectly assume they are accurate.

Educators should always verify:

- factual accuracy;
- references and citations;

- educational recommendations.

Critical evaluation remains an essential professional responsibility.

4.3 Privacy and Confidentiality Risks

Many AI tools process user inputs through cloud-based systems. When sensitive educational information is entered into these platforms, privacy risks may arise.

AI can generate suggestions, but it cannot assume responsibility for educational decisions or learner outcomes.

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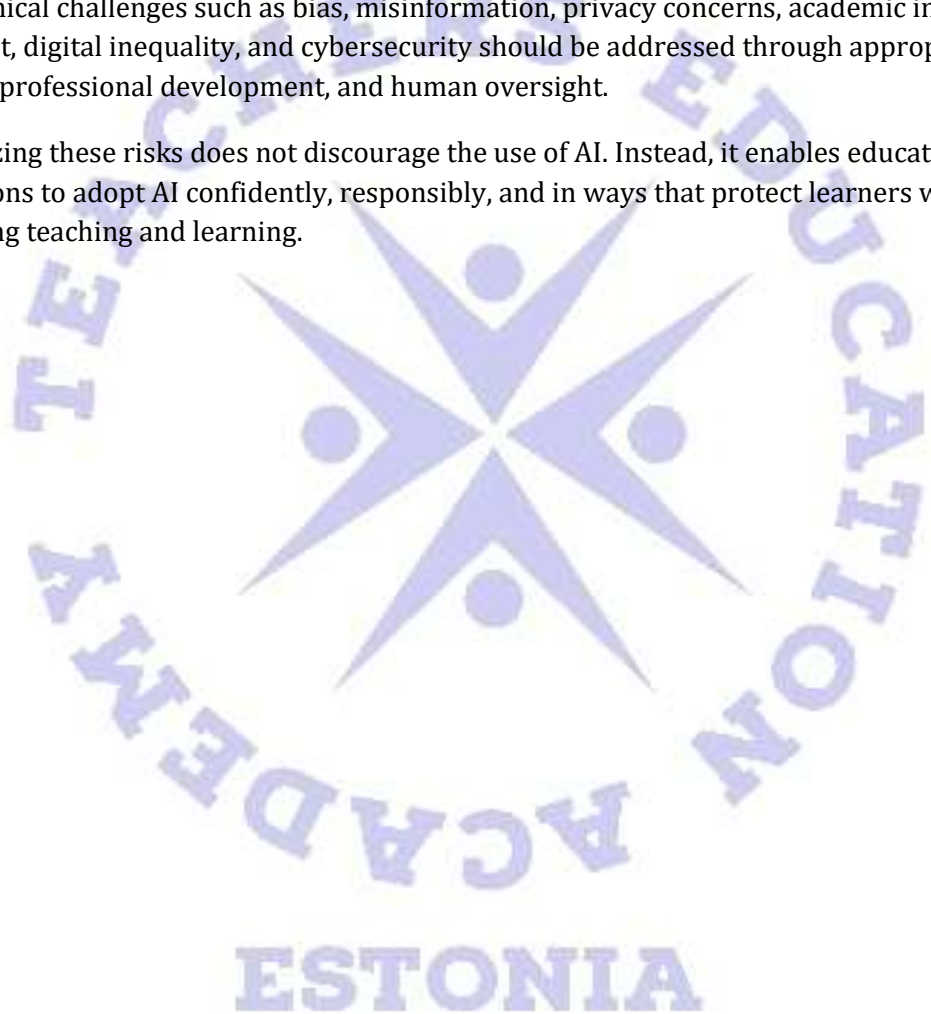
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Every decision involving AI should ultimately be reviewed, interpreted, and approved by qualified educators or authorized institutional personnel.

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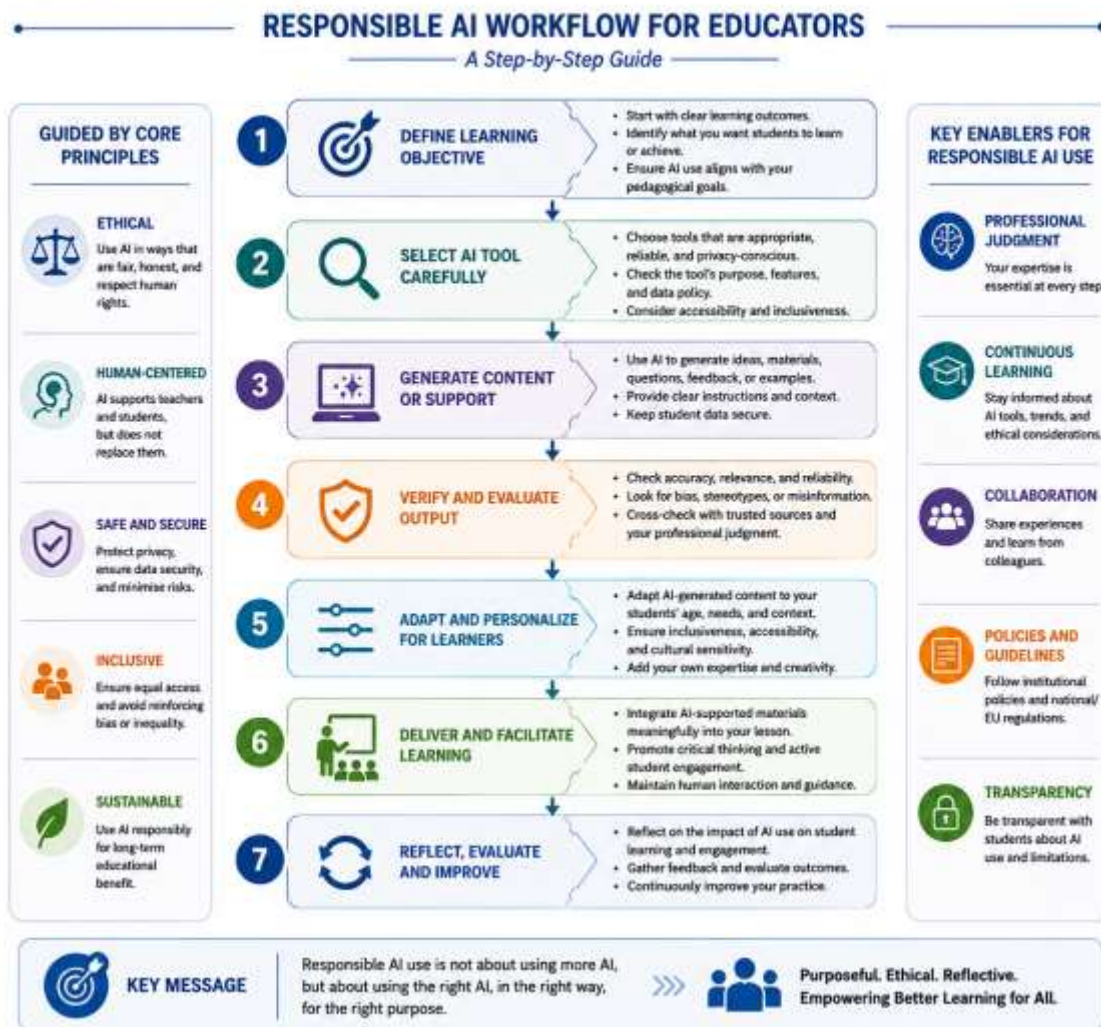

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Responsible AI is demonstrated through everyday professional practice. Teachers play a central role in ensuring that AI enhances learning while maintaining educational quality, academic integrity, and learner well-being.

The following practices support the ethical and effective use of AI in classrooms and other learning environments.

5.1 Verify AI-Generated Content

AI-generated content should never be accepted without review.

Although modern AI systems can produce high-quality educational materials, they may also generate factual inaccuracies, misleading explanations, outdated information, or fabricated references.

Before using AI-generated resources, educators should verify:

- factual accuracy;
- curriculum alignment;
- age appropriateness;
- cultural sensitivity;
- inclusive language;
- references and sources;
- assessment quality.

Professional judgment remains essential in determining whether AI-generated content is suitable for learners.

5.2 Protect Student Privacy

Student privacy should always be prioritized when using AI tools.

Educators should avoid entering personally identifiable or confidential information into public AI systems unless authorized by institutional policy and supported by appropriate legal safeguards.

Examples of information that should not be shared include:

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- student names;
- identification numbers;
- assessment records;

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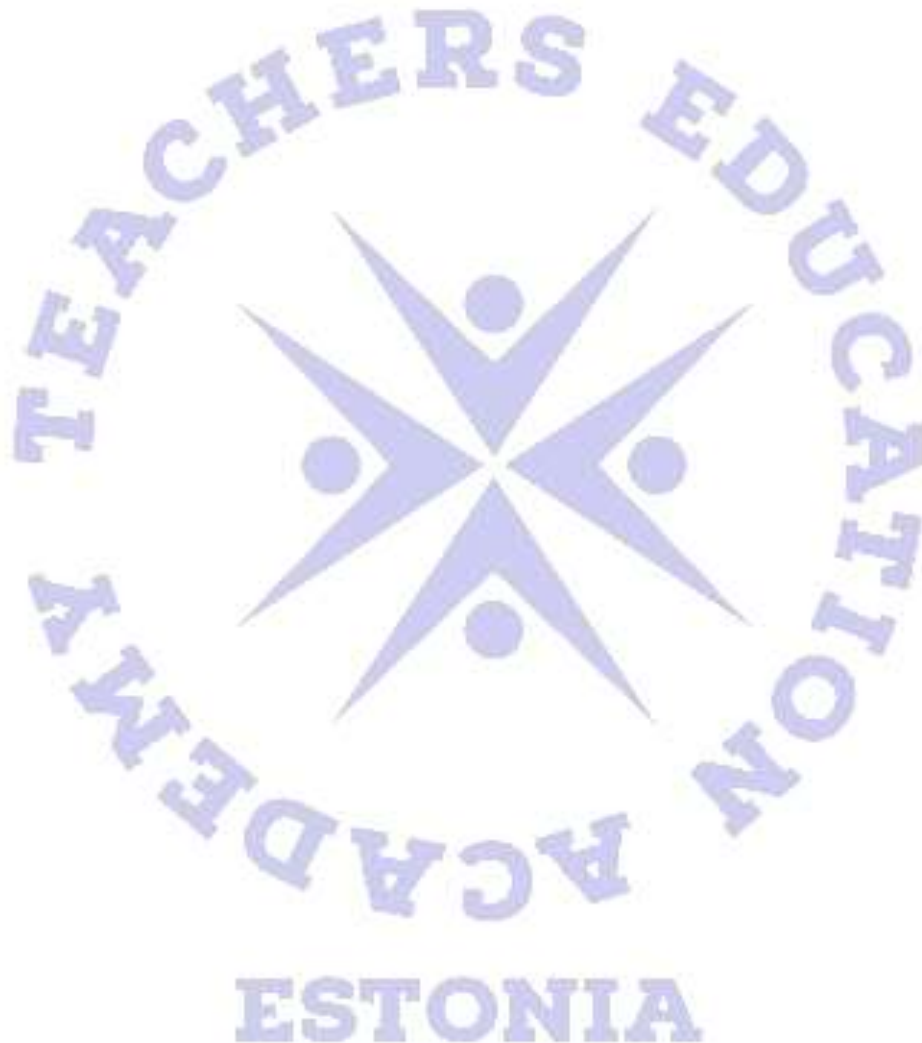

Institutional AI Governance Framework



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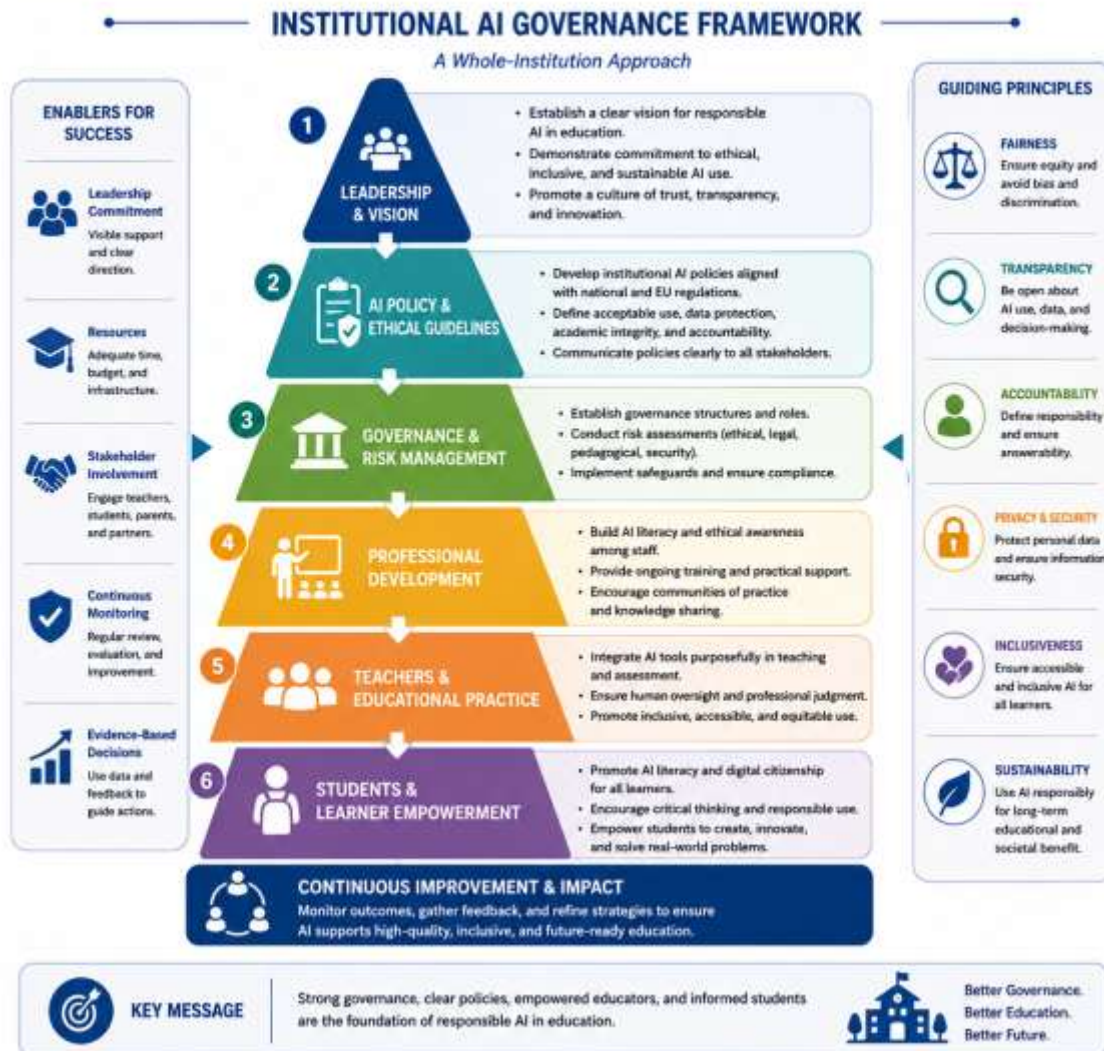

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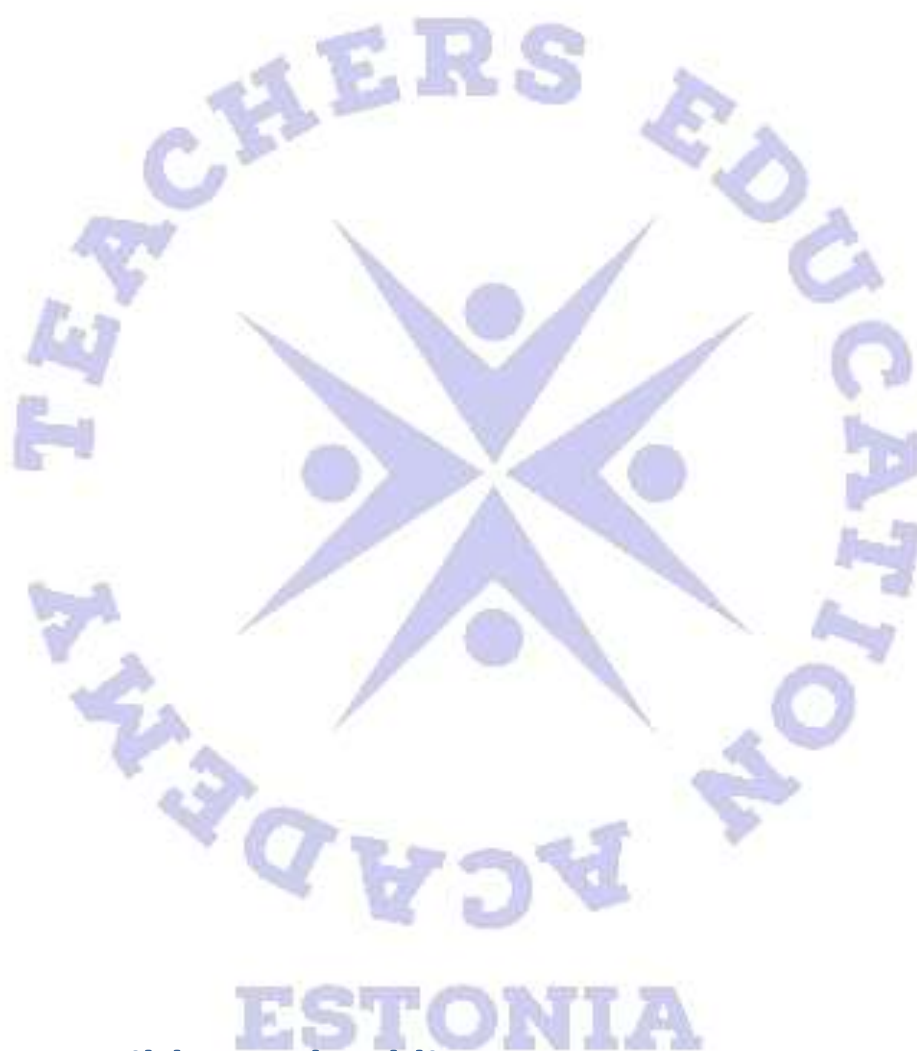
